Pastor Tom's Message

The Road Home

"But while he was still far off, his father saw him and was filled with compassion;

he ran and put his arms around him and kissed him."

— Luke 15:20

By definition, the word *prodigal* means "recklessly profuse in giving, extravagantly generous, like a spendthrift." Although the Parable of the Prodigal Son in Luke 15 makes clear the word's less than admirable qualities, it is also clear that being a "prodigal" is not altogether a bad thing. It could be said that there are actually <u>two prodigals</u> in this parable of Jesus. The loving father in the story could very well be characterized as "recklessly profuse in giving." Certainly his elder son would say so, as he watched his father lavish gifts upon his spendthrift brother – the best robe in the house, the signet ring, and worst of all the fatted calf! It seems that the father's love has no bounds. He takes great joy in welcoming his son back home. He is a "prodigal provider" indeed! His recklessness in the giving of gifts to his son is exceeded only by the reckless joy that he experiences while doing it. Not only do prodigal people give generously, they take great delight in doing so.

According to this definition, it might be noticed that the most prodigal giver we have ever experienced is God. Yes, God, who provides us in the created world far more than we need. Most plants, for example, produce many more seeds than are necessary simply to reproduce the plant — enough that we have the surplus for food, and enough food that we can store some for future use. God didn't have to provide each of us with two arms and two legs, with five fingers and toes, with two kidneys. Look at the homes we live in, the vehicles we travel around in, the incomes many families enjoy. Can you see God smiling and saying, "Yes, I know that it's more than you need, but that's the kind of giver I am — prodigal."

And especially when it comes to the forgiveness of all our sins (all of them!) through the merits of Christ, and the eternity of heaven that God offers us because of Christ's death on our behalf. God is certainly prodigal, "recklessly profuse in giving, extravagantly generous, like a spendthrift." Thanks be to God! Our journey home to God certainly involves each one of us becoming prodigal people, too. During this season of Lent, rather than "giving up" some item or behavior as a sign of our devotion to Christ, let's "give away" God's love as recklessly and profusely as it has been offered to us. God's extravagant provision is wasted upon us if we fail to share it with others. Consider God's gracious provision for you – gifts that are material, spiritual, or familial. How might you extend such gifts to others in this season?

Spanish Ministry

Under the leadership of Luis Soto, our ministry to the Hispanic population in Pittsburgh continues to

grow. In January 2025, Luis began a weekly service in Spanish in Asbury Center on Sunday evening at 6:00 p.m. As we have seen across the country, attendance has fluctuated quite a bit, largely due to a general fear of racial profiling and immigration enforcement actions (regardless of one's legal status). However, Luis continues to provide pastoral care throughout the week, and a lively service with inspiring music and preaching

every Sunday.

In addition, once a month Luis is providing a fellowship dinner after the Sunday service. Groups and individuals can help with these

dinners by sponsoring one monthly meal in 2025. A \$200.00 donation will provide the food and other

items needed, and if possible, your presence will help to show our new friends they are welcome in our church. These have been well attended so far, with a total of 50 participants the February meal by the Kerygma (sponsored Sunday School class). Other financial donations should be sent to the church office with a note that it is for the Spanish Ministry, and of course, you may attend the service at any time. 

Continuing to Provide Hospitality, Fellowship, and Service to Others

In late 2023, Charge Conference approved the merger of the former Missions Committee and the former Community Events and Outreach Committee into a "new" committee — the Missions & Outreach Committee. Said merger became effective on January 1, 2024. The "new" committee hit the ground running and closed 2024 strong.

The Committee, chaired by Rob Spicher, has four subcommittees:

During 2024, the work of these subcommittees included three Lenten Fish Fries, the first-ever volunteer appreciation dinner, daily/bi-monthly/monthly food distributions, a back-to-school backpack drive, a parking lot festival, two Rummage sales for missions, and a Community Thanksgiving Dinner. A similar line-up, along with several additional activities/events/initiatives, is planned for 2025.

The Committee meets bi-monthly (every other month). Meetings are open to the congregation in person or via ZOOM.



CHURCH FINANCIAL INFORMATION

Since 2018, every edition of The Window has included financial information on our Church — this edition is no different. Summarized below are the Church's 2023 actual, 2024 budgeted, and 2024 actual financial results.

The 2024 budget projected a deficit of over \$100,000.00, assuming payment in full of the Connectional Contribution (aka Apportionment). Fortunately, revenues from unbudgeted sources plus expense management resulted in a positive year-end bottom line. Let's hope we can say the same at the end of 2025!

The Finance Committee would like to extend its heartfelt thanks to all whose pledges, non-pledged gifts, and other financial contributions ensured that our staff was paid, our buildings were maintained, and our ministries continued to flourish during 2024. Please keep that financial support coming!

Nyadire, Zimbabwe UPDATES



Girl Empowerment Pad Program: 2024 review, and planting seeds for the future

Thanks to donations from the United Women in Faith (UWF) community, a 13- year-old program in Nyadire, Zimbabwe continues to help more girls sew their own reusable sanitary supplies to avoid missing school during their monthly cycles.

In 2024, the Girl Empowerment Pad (GEP) Program of The Nyadire Connection (TNC) celebrated successful distribution of two major purchases of waterproof fabric; underwear; and cotton and sewing supplies to seven primary schools for use in teaching students to produce their own sanitary pads.

The GEP Program also provided supplies to the Waiting Mother's clinic, along with educational materials. These rural clinics serve communities well beyond Nyadire, so health information reaches individuals in a larger geographic footprint when new Moms return to their villages.

Pictured is the local team sporting blue bags GEP sent to Zimbabwe with the Volunteers in Mission (VIM). They were well received because even basic supplies are scarce in a country where, as in others, women are always hauling necessities.

The GEP team on both sides of the Atlantic has embraced its long-term goal of reducing dependence on funding from the US by establishing and income stream in Zimbabwe via sales of fresh produce. Thus, was born the "Girl Empowerment Garden," the next phase of GEP's evolution.

The pilot garden at Nyamhara launched with soil testing and treatment with agricultural lime. Unfortunately, drought has made farming without irrigation untenable, necessitating extra fundraising for irrigation systems.

As GEP partners continue to seek reliable water sources and sustainability, we ask for your continued support of the program.


With Completion of Chindenga Clinic in Zimbabwe, The Nyadire Connection (TNC) Achieves "Moon Shot"

PITTSBURGH and ZIMBABWE, Feb. 11, 2025 – The Nyadire Connection (TNC), a Pittsburgh-based nonprofit, has completed a decade-long project to rebuild six rural medical clinics in Zimbabwe. TNC representatives plan to attend a dedication ceremony on Feb. 22 at the Chindenga Clinic to celebrate the occasion.

"We called it a 'moon shot' because when this project began, we had no idea if we could raise \$2 million to make it happen," said TNC Chairman Ralph Duckworth of New Sewickley Twp., who plans to attend the ceremony. "Today, we can say 'Mission Accomplished!' thanks to the commitment, passion and support

of our network churches* and many individual donors."

TNC (<u>www.nyadire.org</u>) was founded in 2006, when 18 Pittsburgh residents visited the United Methodist Mission in Nyadire, Zimbabwe. Since then, TNC has sponsored several mission trips annually, built strong relationships at the mission, and provided administrative support and funding for its orphanage, hospital and farm.



The vision came into focus in 2013, when TNC toured each clinic, met with church and government health officials, and listened to stories from people in the local communities. They discovered the clinics were the first line of defense for thousands of villagers with diseases such as malaria, cholera and HIV; and that expectant mothers walked to the clinics from as far as 10 miles away to deliver. In the past 10 years, villagers handmade hundreds of thousands of bricks used in the projects, and local construction workers rebuilt the clinics on time and on budget.

Hannah Mafunda, health coordinator of the Zimbabwe Episcopal Area Health Board, previously documented many improvements in health care, including:

- With adequate staff housing, medical personnel at the clinics has more than doubled
- With more space for delivery rooms, at-home births have been reduced by half
- Clinics have adequate space to test and treat patients with malaria, and to ensure privacy and confidentiality for each patient
- More shelters for expectant mothers has led to improved birth outcomes
- Additional housing for staff has enabled the clinics to accept more student nurses, expanding opportunities for education and jobs
